Dear friends and colleagues,

As Programme Chairs, we are delighted to welcome everyone to Potsdam for the 16th Pan-European Conference on International Relations! The theme of this year's conference - "Envisioning a new normal" - is inspired by the city in which we are gathering. During the final days of the Second World War, it was host to the Potsdam Conference where the leading Allied Powers held the final of its three summits on postwar order. The meeting turned out to be a historical transition point from the crisis of the war years towards a new era marked by radically different notions of the international in political, economic, and social terms.

In our present days, the need for new visions of social and political order seems no less pressing. In light of the lasting effects of the COVID-19 global pandemic, the rise of Russian militarism and imperial ambitions, conservative backlash and democratic backsliding in many parts of the world, the effects of climate change and global warming, and many other forms of crises and unruliness around the globe, reading the news has turned into literal 'doom-scrolling'. Likewise, academic analyses of global politics are painting an increasingly gloomy picture that mirrors empirical turmoils.

All the more is there a need for hope, creativity, and courage in reimagining the international. Clearly, an academic gathering is not and should not be a political conference. Yet, we believe that when the International Relations community comes together, there is ample potential for productive positivity. So rather than reproducing the pessimism that seems to have befallen society and academia alike, it is our intention to use this year's conference theme for a call to collectively look for visions of a 'new normal'.

We understand the new normal as an altered political, economic, and social order arising out of a period of crisis. Imagining a new normal by definition implies breaking with old certainties, with entrenched habits, and not least also with established patterns that we as analysts and interpreters of the world are accustomed to. The conference theme in this sense encourages us to creatively explore what a new normal could look like in (geo)political, social, economic, ethical, and not least scientific terms. The search for a new normal forms a cross-cutting theme that is inextricably entangled with all aspects and sub-fields of the academic discipline of IR.

Throughout the past year, our work as Programme Chairs has been very rewarding yet at times also challenging - but we could always rely on the support and help of our colleagues. We would like to extend a special thank you to Burak Tansel and the EISA board, as well as the local organizing team in Potsdam around Andrea Liese and Thomas Sommerer. Last but not least, we want to thank the section chairs for their tremendous work in putting together a total of

48 rich, innovative, and truly exciting sections (24 standing sections, 23 regular sections, and an online section).

During a time when economic, political, and other conditions for academic work are deteriorating in many countries, we appreciate the possibility to come together as a professional community - to meet, to network, and to inspire each other. We are very much looking forward to a stacked and diverse program, and to meeting and seeing so many wonderful and smart colleagues not just from Europe, but from many different parts of the world.

LOCAL ORGANISERS' WELCOME

Dear friends and colleagues,

We are delighted to welcome you to the 16th Pan-European Conference on International Relations here at the University of Potsdam on 5–9 September 2023.

With 20,000 students, 364 professors, and 587 academic employees, the University of Potsdam is the largest research institution in a city with a high density of academic and scientific facilities. In 2021, our university celebrated its 30th anniversary. The ensemble of buildings at Griebnitzsee, where the conference takes place, is one of three campus sites and hosts the Faculty of Economics and Social Sciences. The Department of Political Science and Public Administration offers various degree programs for currently 1,300 students, such as the interdisciplinary BA programs in Politics, Administration and Organization and in Politics and Economics, the Master program in National and International Administration and Policy, and the Master program in International Relations.

Beyond offering the comforts of a campus surrounded by lakes, parks, and the famous Babelsberg film studios and only a short commute from the centres of Berlin and Potsdam, our conference location is a stark reminder of a turbulent and evil history and its transformation. The Little Red Riding Hood sculptures, which one can find at three locations on campus, shall symbolize the site's history. The red colour symbolizes the German Red Cross (which Hitler had brought in line), the Soviet Red Army, and the socialist GDR: The Prussian Red Cross, which had possessed the ground since 1896, used the site for mobile depots and hospitals. Under the Nazi regime, forced labourers had to erect new houses to deposit clothes, sanitary items and other equipment before delivery in the German Reich. The main building (house 1), built between 1938 and 1943 in the heroizing style of Nazi architecture, later hosted the German Red Cross headquarter. Parts of nowadays cafeteria served as a former mess hall of the Nazi officers. After 1945, the Soviet Military Administration used the university grounds. Not far from the conference site, you will also find a neighbourhood dominated by old mansions where Churchill, Stalin, and Truman resided during the Potsdam Conference in the immediate aftermath of the war and from where the US president gave the order to drop the nuclear bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Between 1952 and 1991, the campus buildings housed the Academy of Legal Studies and Political Science of the GDR, which trained East German government elites and diplomats. The death strip shielding Potsdam from West Berlin was literally only a stone's throw away from the campus. The train station that most participants will use to get to the conference was a vital border checkpoint for interzonal transit traffic from West Germany to West Berlin.

"Little Red Riding Hood" is a European fairy tale about a young girl and a wolf. The absence of the wolf symbolizes the transformation from dangerous and evil premises to a safe space. So does the more recent architecture on campus, where concrete (house 6) breaks into the old bricks to symbolize the democra-

tization of the country and the university. The famous Potsdam Conference and the moment of founding a new university in 1991 mark how Potsdam and our campus have often been “envisioning a new normal”, the conference theme of EISA PEC 2023. We hope to offer the right place to stimulate a discussion of new visions of social and political order arising from crises.

We thank all involved in preparing and organizing EISA’s flagship Pan-European conference in Potsdam. We are very grateful to Beate Jahn, the former EISA president, for planting the seeds of our collaboration with EISA in September 2019 and to Burak Tansel, who took over the presidency two years after, and Gabi Schlag, EISA’s Executive Secretary, for accomplishing this mission. It was a pleasure and a privilege to plan this conference with you and the program chairs, Dagmar Vorlíček and Matthias Leese! We also wish to thank Barbora Smejkalová, the entire C-IN team, Karola Schulz, and P3 for making all the necessary logistical arrangements. Special thanks are due to the President of our university, Oliver Günther; the dean of the faculty, Maik Heinemann; Nadine Bültel and the deanery staff; Maria Lübke and Elena Sondermann; and many more for their support. Finally, we are indebted to all student volunteers. Without your excellent work, none of this would have been possible!

We wish you a pleasant and productive stay at the University of Potsdam and the unique sites this city and region have to offer.

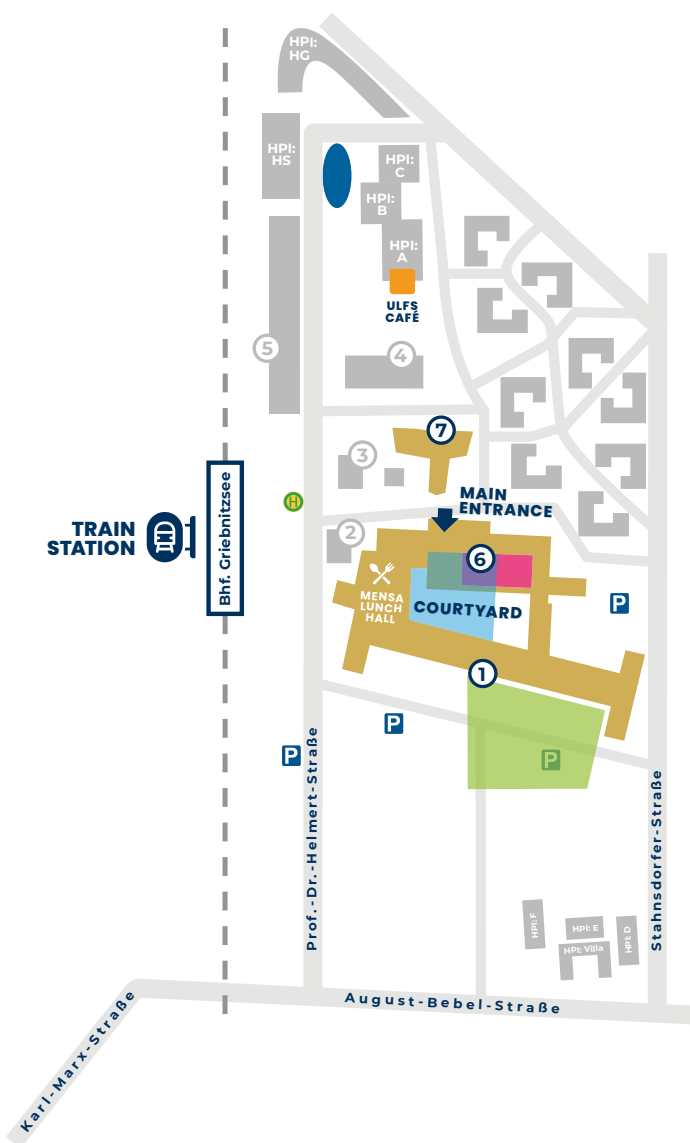

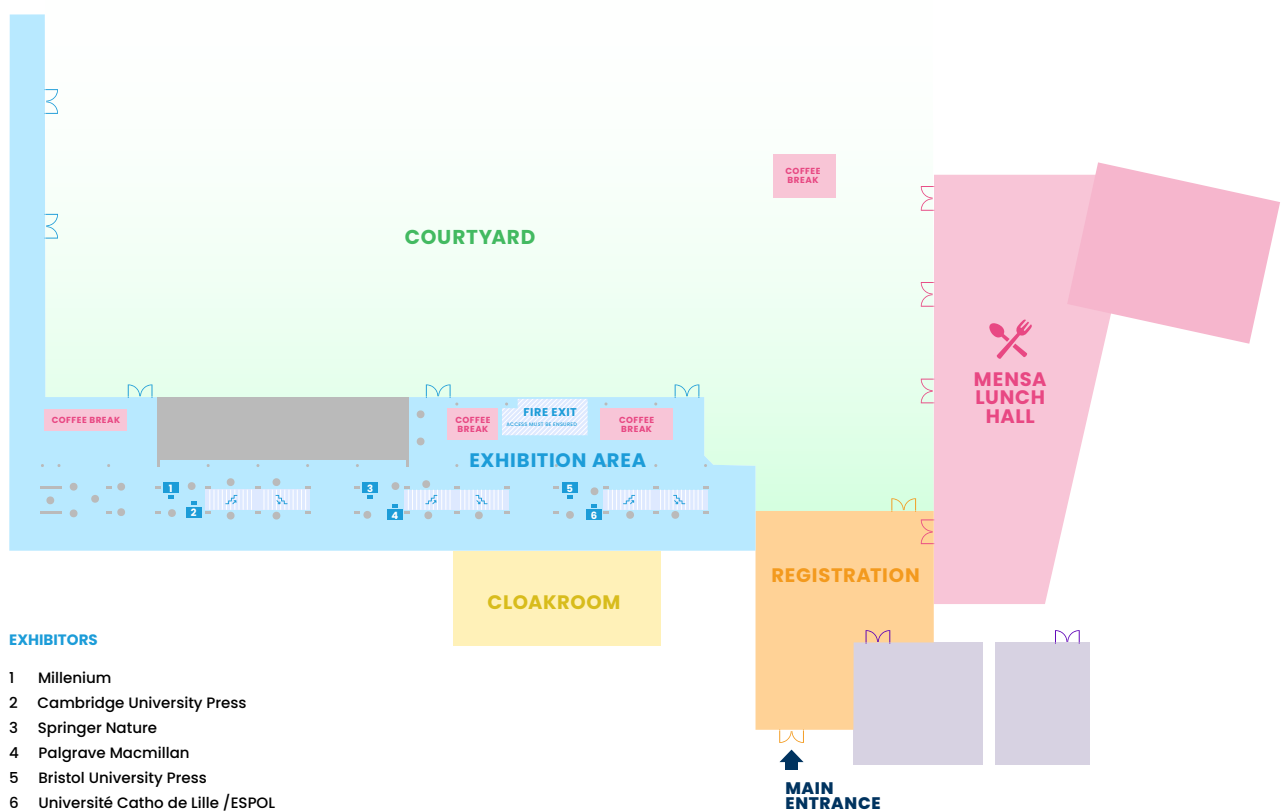

ELECTRICITY

For Germany there are two associated plug types, types C and F. Plug type C is the plug which has two round pins and plug type F is the plug which has two round pins with two earth clips on the side. Germany operates on a 230V supply voltage and 50Hz.

CLIMATE

Potsdam has a moderate maritime climate influenced by the Atlantic Ocean. The climate also has characteristics of a continental climate. Extremes in weather are uncommon. The summers are comfortable and partly cloudy and the winters are long, cold, windy, and mostly cloudy. Over the course of the year, the temperature typically varies from -1°C to 25°C. Based on the [tourism score](#), the best time of year to visit Potsdam for warm-weather activities is from mid June to early September.

CURRENCY

The official currency of Germany is the Euro. Germany is a part of the eurozone

– 19 European countries that use the euro as their official currency. Most German businesses are well set up to receive card payments. Some of the best travel money cards include debit, credit and prepaid cards. But before you use your bank card willy-nilly, it's worth reading up on the fees and charges you might incur.

TIPPING

Tipping isn't mandatory in Germany, but if you receive exceptional service or want to show appreciation, leaving a small gratuity is always appreciated. Tips are between 5% and 10% in Germany. The amount you tip differs on the type of service you receive. For a small or casual meal, or for drivers and bartenders, most Germans round up their bill and add a couple of euros.

GETTING AROUND IN POTSDAM

The state capital Potsdam in the heart of Brandenburg is easy to reach by car as well as by train from all directions. The location within the Berlin motorway ring connects Potsdam with all major roads leading to Berlin. From Berlin, where all long-distance trains stop, S-Bahn and regional trains take you quickly to Potsdam. Due to the proximity of the airport Berlin Brandenburg Airport (BER) you can also reach Potsdam comfortably by plane. Trams, buses and ferries run day and night.

Arriving by public transport or train

The S7 and several regional trains run from

Berlin to Potsdam. Potsdam is connected to the intercity and regional transport network of Deutsche Bahn. Long-distance trains stop at Berlin Main Station, from where you can take the S-Bahn to Potsdam Main Station in approx. 45 minutes. Regional express trains from Magdeburg or Brandenburg/Havel are much faster.

Arriving by plane from Berlin Brandenburg Airport (BER)

The regional train (RB 22) connects Berlin Brandenburg Airport BER, Terminal 1–2 with Potsdam every hour. The Anger bus line BER2 runs 15 times a day between the airport and Potsdam Main Station – at different times to the RB22 trains. The buses are on the way for almost an hour. At the airport, both the stops at Terminal 5 and Terminal 1–2 are served. The VBB tariff plus a comfort surcharge also applies on this line. Operating period from approx. 4:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

ViP is the public tram and bus system in Potsdam. You can view Google's English translation of the tourist pages on its Web site in a new window.

Havelbus provides bus service in the region around Potsdam. Its site is in German, but you can view Google's English translation in a new browser window.

Potsdamer Wassertaxi stops at 13 locations along the Havel River and its lakes, including the main railroad station. You can buy single tickets or day tickets, and bicycles can be taken on board for a small fee.

Mobil in Potsdam shows current road projects, public parking, bicycle rentals and bike stations, and other useful information for visitors. If you don't read German, see Google Translate's Mobil in Potsdam English version.

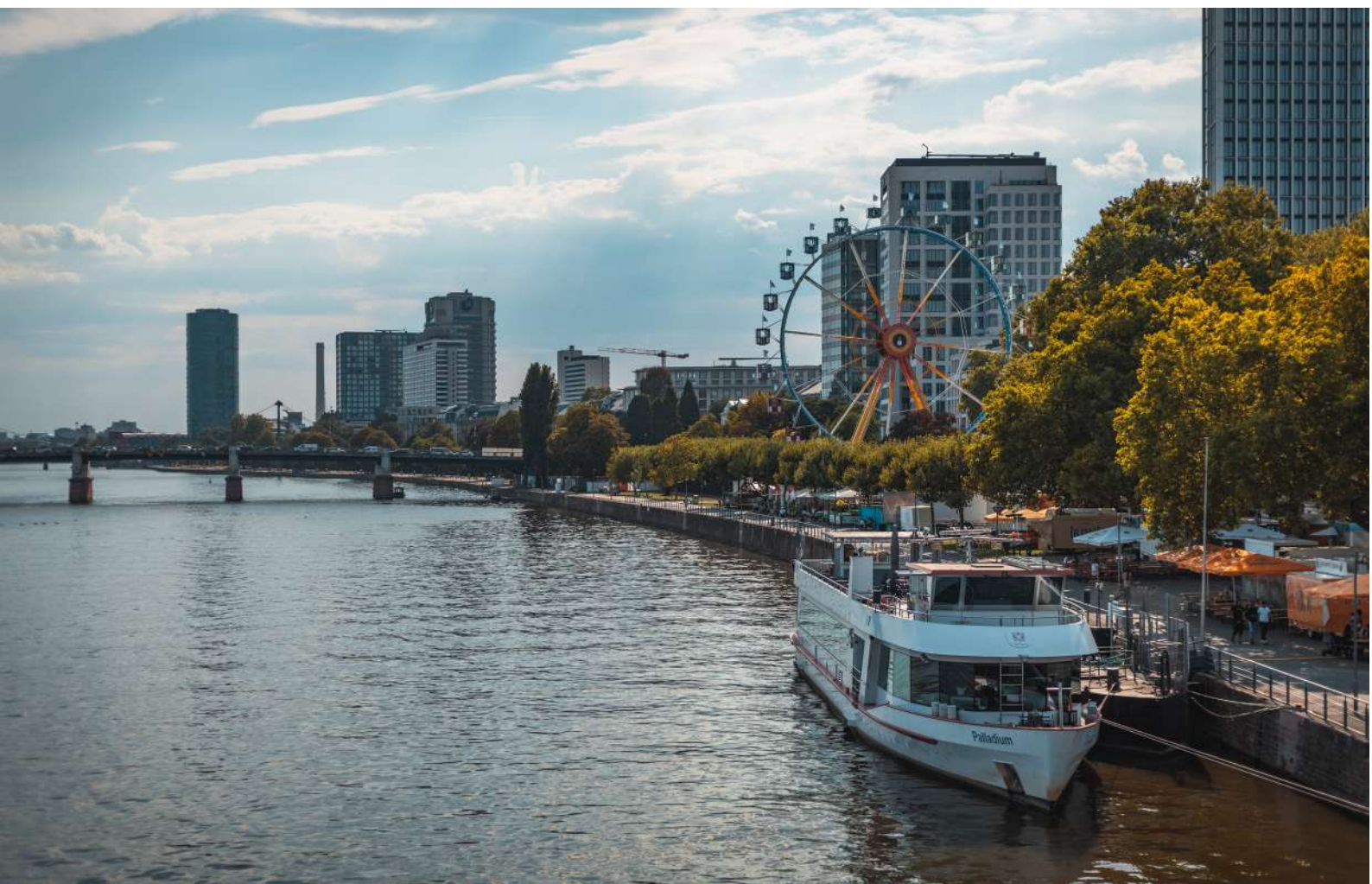

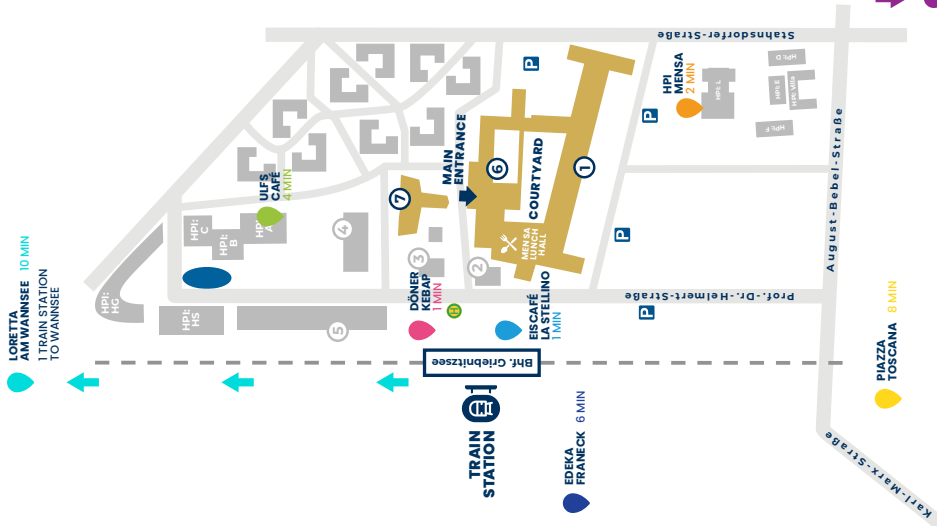
